Chuck and Sue Hamaker's 1939 Plymouth Convertible, Seattle Washington

Chuck and Sue Hamaker are Cascade Pacific Plymouth Club members from the Seattle, Washington area. Chuck and Sue have been married for 42 years and have 5 children. They both are now retired.

Chuck had always liked "old cars", In 1968 he bought a barn full of Mopar parts, books and tools from a Mount Vernon, Washington Dodge dealer. For the next 20 years Chuck bought and sold Mopar parts at swap meets and ebay. Over the years Chuck says the best aspect of dealing with old cars is the friends he has made.

Chuck has made a couple of trips to the Annual Hershey Swap Meet and recommends it to anyone who thinks they have seen it all.

Over the years chuck has owned many Plymouths including: '41 Plymouth Sedan Delivery, '49 Plymouth Convertible (still has), '49 Plymouth Club Coupe, 1939 Plymouth convertible (still has), and 1939 Plymouth Convertible (just purchased). Chuck has also owned many other models of classic cars from; Desotos, Dodges, Chryslers, Cadillacs, Oldsmoblies, Buicks, Pontiacs and an Opal.

The most recent of Chucks purchases was a 1939 Plymouth convertible, which he first saw in the March, 1995 Hemmings. There was a letter from Idaho with two pictures of a 1939 Plymouth convertible. All members are welcome to attend and become a part of the Tech Committee. Feel free to bring in your mechanical aches and pains and the group will strive for a cure.


With pleasure we announce the marriage of member lim Thorkildson, and welcome his new wife Shirley as an Associate member.

After 35 hours of hard labor, consisting of a marathon drive to Pasadena, California and back, Dave and Vicki brought their new baby home to Canby, Oregon. The car, a 50, is to commemorate Vicki's May 21st 50th birthday.

Vicki has wanted a 1949 or 1950 Suburban for some time and recently spotted one on Ebay. Now, Dave and Vicki once drove almost to San Diego California to look at a 1947 2-door sedan they had seen on Ebay. That time the car hadn't sold so they were just looking to see if they wanted to purchase it. It looked beautiful in the pictures but when they got there it was pretty rough. They turned around and drove back home supposedly with a lesson learned not to trust a picture.

When the Suburban showed up on Ebay all the flaws seemed to be visible so they broke their own rule and bid on it sight unseen. After several emails back and forth to the seller it was decided they should be able to drive the car home. The next morning they drove three hours and arrived just outside Pasadena and there was the 50.

It is really a late issue 1949 as it has many of the attributes of the 1949 model, except for the split back window. As should have been expected it was a little rougher than the pictures showed but mechanically in great shape, except there were no windshield wipers! That is not a problem in California but Oregon is a different matter.

The car had a new floor installed and there were openings cut around the clutch and throttle pedals and with no working heater it gave a cool ride a new definition. Also the exhaust pipe was cut off right about where the spare tire wheel well was and those holes let in a strong exhaust smell.

The Suburban has "cute" sliding windows in the back so Dave opened them to let the exhaust out.

April guest speaker has suggestions to help you locate those hard to find parts

The April guest speaker for the April 22 regular member meeting was Mr. Rich Moccardine, district manager of CarQuest. Rich has been with CarQuest for 31 years. Rich explained that CarQuest has 4000 stores with 50 distribution centers, one of which is in Portland servicing 62 stores.

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The theme of Rich's talk was availability of old car parts. National and local car clubs are an excellent source. There are vendors who reproduce obsolete parts as well as Hemmings and don't forget the local parts store. Depending on how old your car is there could be parts on the shelf you are looking for.


Even in the computer age we are in sometimes you need to dig into the good old paper catalogues. Most parts stores have old catalogues on the back shelf which can be a gold mine of part numbers, which can be cross referenced to parts that were used in different makes and models of cars besides yours.

In some cases you can ask to see if your parts store has an interchange program. With a little work you may find what you are looking for.

Generally, if you have a classic car from the 40's on up, there are brake cylinders, tune-up parts, belts, switches, brake parts and hoses. Sometimes you can get parts rebuilt, or sleeved to get you back in business.

Rich offered to donate a set of old parts catalogues to the club as a resource.




