Remembering Our Friend, Ray Dunn

A Tribute to Ray Dunn

CPPC is more than just a car club with people interested in Plymouths. It is like one large family with people interested in and caring for each other. We have lost one of our family members and we are heartbroken. As we take Ray's wife, Virginia, under our wings and grieve with her we reflect on what a good Mopar guy he was.

Ray Dunn was a quiet unassuming man with a slightly gruff exterior who was a teddy bear inside and would never say a bad word about anyone. He was a lot like his '37 Plymouth pickup: strong, reliable with lots of integrity. Not flashy in primer black. The gruff look came from the bad boy hemi engine under the hood. Ironically Ray was also like his newly acquired '48 Plymouth 4D sedan that he purchased from Dave Williams. The car had a soft gentle nostalgic appearance like Ray, but the car's engine was a little tired with a slight knock. Ray, it turns out was a little tired himself and had a pretty well worn out blood pump.

Ray had plans of replacing the "heart" in the car but unfortunately his own heart had other ideas. The day he broke his leg he and Dave were installing the stock front springs and removing the rear lowering blocks so that the car would get back its stock look. The kind of look Ray preferred. This job went well and brought a little spring into Ray's step; he was thrilled with the new look. Unfortunately, a last minute trip up the stairs right before he was to head home to Salem ended with Ray falling and severely breaking his leg.

After over two weeks in a nursing home waiting for the swelling to recede he was transferred to Emmanuel

Hospital for surgery to repair his leg. Unfortunately the head mechanic upstairs decided this was one engine that couldn't be repaired and Ray passed away peacefully on his birthday, October 9, 2008.

Ray was a package deal. We usually referred to Ray as "Ray and Virginia". Virginia was always by his side at meetings, car shows and all of life's events. Virginia was even known to take their pickup to a car show by herself at times when Ray was working. She was as proud of that truck as Ray. Obviously Virginia is heartbroken by the loss of her other half. The Mopar section of Heaven just got a little more knowledgeable.

We will miss you, Ray.

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

Tech Talk With The Fox



DIRECT CURRENT GENERATOR

Test Ammeter Shows Discharge

1. Test Ammeter Shows Discharge With Engine Running At Fast Idle

a. Connect a jumper wire from the base of the regulator to the frame of the generator. Increase engine speed slowly to fast idle. If the ammeter shows a charge, then the ground to the regulator is defective.

b. Regulator ground: Tighten mounting screws and then examine the regulator ground strap for a brake. Replace strap if necessary.

c. Regulator: Connect a jumper wire from the regulator base to the field terminal at the regulator. If this causes the ammeter to show a charge when the engine speed is increases then install a NEW regulator.

d. Regulator Field Terminal and connections: With a jumper lead grounded to the regulator, connect the other end of the wire to the field terminal of the generator, (small terminal stud). Increase the engine speed. If the ammeter registers a charge, the cable from the generator field to the regulator field terminal is defective.

2. Battery Test For A Weak or Discharged Battery

Inspect cables in the charging circuit for looseness and the battery terminals for corrosion.

3. Fan Belt

Make sure the fan belt is in good condition and the adjustment is proper.

4. Wiring

Inspect wiring for frayed or worn insulation in the generating circuit.

5. Regulator

With engine at fast idle connect a jumper test lead from the field terminal on the generator to the ground. If ammeter now shows a charge, the regulator may be at fault.

6. Generator

If the preceding tests do not determine cause of trouble, remove and test generator.

Test Meter Shows High Charge

If the test ammeter continues to indicate a high charge after the engine had run for a short time, examine the following parts for possible loose connections to ground:

a. Generator: Remove the field lead from the field terminal at the generator.

If the ammeter shows a charge on fast idle, remove generator and test field coils for ground.

b. Wiring: Inspect wiring from the generator to the regulator for loose terminal connections or worn insulation. Remove field lead from the field terminal at the regulator and protect it from grounding. If ammeter shows charge at fast idle, it is an indication that there is a grounded condition.

c. Regulator: If the test ammeter fails to show a charge under the test described in 1 & 2, the regulator should be removed and tested.

Excessive Loss of Battery Fluid

If the battery is continually low in fluid, or will not hold fluid, check the following causes.

1. Battery Case: Inspect for broken or cracked battery case.

2. Voltage Regulator: Inspect for an improperly adjusted regulator. Excessive evaporation of battery fluid will occur when battery becomes overheated, due to high charging rate.

Continual Loss of Battery Charge

If the battery can be fully charged, but will not retain the charge, one of the following conditions may exist:

1. Short Circuit: Check for a short circuit in the wiring system, make sure that the top of the battery is clean.

2. Check to be sure no lights, radios, are turned on when parking your vehicle for a long period of time, such as two, three or more hours. *Submitted By Jimmie Fox*

USING REGULAR RUBBER FUEL HOSE IN A FUEL INJECTED CAR

Major **Don't** - unless you like engine fires. Unlike older cars with carburetors, the pressure in the fuel lines of a fuel-injected car can be as high 40 psi (vs. 5-8 psi in a car with a carburetor). Use the wrong type of hose - such as the less expensive standard fuel hose instead of the higher cost, high-pressure line specifically designed for FI cars - and you'd better have a fire extinguisher handy. Or just not much like the car you're driving right now.

"SPLICING" DAMAGED BRAKE LINES

This **Don't** is even more fraught with danger than the use of low-grade (low pressure) rubber fuel hose in a high-pressure, fuel-injected car. Because at least with an engine fire, you'll probably be able to stop the car, get out - and flee. But if the brakes fail due to hydraulic problems caused by a cheesy spliced-in section of line - well, you can't just open the door and get out at 60 mph. If a steel brake line is damaged or rusty, the proper repair is to replace the entire section with a new steel line. Never patch in a section like you were trying to fix a leaky kitchen sink - unless you're looking to try an unusual form of assisted suicide.

ANTIFREEZE

It is that time of the year to test the antifreeze in your chariot, be it a new Car or an old Car. Having it tested to be sure it is in the safe range may prevent a nasty job of replacing a soft plug or, worse yet, a frozen engine block. If one cannot afford to purchase new antifreeze each year, then it is best to drain that cooling system and refill it in the spring of next year. *Submitted By Jimmie Fox*

Fall Mayflower Tours Feature Distillery, History, Culinary Topics

On Friday, September 19, 11 adventurous ladies met at 2389 NW Wilson in Portland for a tour of the Clear Creek Distillery.

In his travels, owner Stephen McCarthy had been intrigued by the schnapps and brandy made in France and Germany and was determined to learn the technique.

In 1980 he started the Clear Creek Distillery. Using fruit from the family orchard in Parkdale, they have perfected their own grappa (wine), fruit brandy, liqueur, and single malt whiskey. They also have pear-in-the-bottle, which requires wiring wine bottles to the trees as the fruit starts to form. Their fruit-in-the-bottle is rather limited and of course expensive.

Mr. McCarthy took us through the plant, showing and explaining the process of taking 46,000 pounds of fruit, fermenting, separating, and distilling. We were then introduced to Jeanine, who took us to the tasting room to learn more and sample the various brandies and liqueurs. What an experience!

On October 17 eight Mayflowers met at the World Forestry Center located near the Oregon Zoo for a tour.

Mark Reed, the center's curator of exhibit, welcomed the group and shared the history of the original forestry building which was built in preparation for the Lewis and

Clark Centennial and American Pacific Exposition and Oriental Fair in 1905.

The current World Forestry Center is a modern, beautiful facility and has displays from around the world, along with special features such as the current Doggie Palooza event, a fair for dog-centric visitors, vendors and agencies.

We skirted the Hoyt Arboretum visiting the Viet Nam Memorial and the Visitors Center before going to lunch at the Old Spaghetti Factory. Another nice day!
