





# OFF THE HOOK –

In March and April of 2018, I wrote articles about various types of adhesives that could be of use on vintage autos. One of the classes of adhesives is Cyanoacrylate Adhesives, better known as “CA” adhesives or glue. This material became famous when it was marketed as “Super Glue” many years ago. I thought it might be of interest to go into the features of this product in more detail – so “stick around” and read on!

First off – this product can be dangerous if not handled properly! It is best to wear disposable gloves when using it – even if you don’t think you will need them. The glue sets so fast that it is not uncommon to press something in place, or try to wipe the glue up. Bingo – stuck to your skin. When using more than a couple of drops in a small area – the fumes are VERY bad. Saturating porous materials makes it worse, as it can rapidly heat up and release vapors. But when handled properly, it has many wonderful uses on cars.

The picture of “bottles” shows my arsenal of CA products. There are thick, medium and thin formulations that I use, a solvent remover in case it gets on your skin, as well as both a small bottle and a spray bottle of accelerator. I have also shown a disposable syringe with a blunt tipped needle (from Amazon). The accelerator will set the glue almost instantly (it will not normally set instantly when pressed between two smooth surfaces or applied thickly) Accelerator works great, but can cause small bubbles in the glue, and it can damage some surfaces when applied from a spray bottle. The small syringe with liquid accelerator is good for applications with sensitive surfaces, as it can be dribbled right onto the glue.

This glue is NOT inexpensive. Each of the three CA bottles shown runs around \$10. It also has a shelf life typically under a year – and thickens somewhat over time. Don’t overbuy – and for most applications medium works well. I use the thin formulation least –




as it will penetrate and run very rapidly, not building up much mass. It can get away from you and there is no going back! Hobby stores may carry CA products, as do major woodworking chains such as Rockler and Woodcrafters.

I have shown another image with small applications of each viscosity onto porous craft type paper. The difference between thick and medium is obvious. Thin is a bit deceptive – mostly because it was impossible to put just a few drops on – and it saturated the paper. Normally, thin would not puddle up.

So where to use it on your vintage vehicle? With thick, you can stick down vinyl and cloth if careful, as well as wetting of various types. Of course, metal to metal and adhesion to plastic and glass are also viable. Using either thick or medium, you can bond rubber (weatherstripping, trunk seals, gaskets) to metals as well as clearcoat surfaces. It works great for putting on weatherstripping around doors. An added bo-

nus using CA is that the bond between rubber and painted doors is almost invisible due to the transparency of the glue. No more fighting with sticky black weather strip adhesive. (Thank you to Doug Crawford for that tip!). The last picture shown is one of a piece of high quality Steele Rubber weather strip bonded to a clear coat auto paint. I tried to peel the rubber off the clear coat – and it tore the rubber in half! Very good bond.

I hope that these insights will help you around your garage. Of course, there are a bunch of uses for CA around the entire house. Just be very careful when handling it!



The National Neon Sign Museum is located in the heart of The Dalles downtown historic district. The museum captures the history, craftsmanship, and culture that shaped America, as seen through the lens of the signage and advertising industry.

With its focus on the evolution of the electric sign, from pre-electric and gold leaf signage to the invention and widespread use of plastic, the museum's current assets represent one of the largest collections of neon storefront signs in the world. Full installation is scheduled

to be completed 2018.

The collection is filled with an expansive range of signage and artifacts related to the sign industry, including many one-of-a-kind signs and displays that cannot be seen on public display anywhere else in the world. Along with the animated and figural 'Dog n' Suds' sign and the Howard Johnson's 'Simple Simon,' the collection also includes one of the rarest groupings of West Coast petroleum signs ever assembled, including Richfield-'Eagle,' Seaside, Polly, Associated, and the Buffalo sign.

## From Bob Westphal – Throttle body bushing repair

My Barracuda's has had a smell of raw fuel when I shut the car off. I found that the throttle shaft bushings are worn causing fuel leakage on the manifold. There are several solutions that will cure throttle body wear. Replacing the carburetor is usually very costly. I decided to see if there is a better way to solve this problem. I found there are number of throttle body bushing kits available on line for a wide spread number of carburetors and cost as shown below.




The ZA-01 5/16» throttle shaft repair kit from ATS Enterprises-\$206.67 Canadian.

E-bay-39.99

Amazon-HENKYO Throttle Shaft Bushing Repair kit- \$36.

I purchased the Henkyo kit that came with eight 5/16 bushings, a special reamer, and no instructions. All kits will work on almost all throttle bodies.



1.Disassemble and clean the carburetor or throttle body. Remove the throttle shaft.

2.Lubricate the tool and throttle body using WD-40 or equivalent light oil. Insert the chuck end of the tool into a hand-held drill and tighten the chuck.

3.Insert the pilot end into the throttle shaft hole in the carburetor or throttle body.

4.With slight pressure and turning at moderate speed ream out the hole until the built-in stop on the tool is reached.


5.Remove the tool.

6.Drive the bushing in using a hex-head bolt as driver.

7.Reassemble the throttle body or carburetor.

Unlike old-style reaming tools,

the kit does not require precision machining skills, a drill press, complicated jigs, additional drill bits etc. The Throttle Shaft Tool is a one-piece, foolproof solution to installing bushings with perfect alignment.



As can be seen, I used a drill press because I couldn't apply enough pressure with a drill motor.
