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


New Business:

...and Safety Tips

All of these safety checks and more are very important to the operation of the vehicle. If one of the above fails to do its job, the vehicle could be stalled on a roadway, which will set up a hazard for yourself as well as other drivers. If you do have something cause you to make a stop, try your very best to move off of the roadway to clear the path of oncoming traffic in all directions.

Place warning devices along the edge of your vehicle, then another about 100 feet in back of your vehicle, and then another about 100 feet in back of the second warning device, but leaving the roadway clear. If you have flares in your emergency kit, DO NOT light them if you have a gasoline leak. Use something that will not set fire to the gasoline. Make sure all passengers are out of and away from the vehicle.




