

OFF THE HOOK - Electrical Shorts!

Electrical Shorts!

Now that I have your attention, this month's article is not about electrical shorts as such, but rather some short insights about electrical issues with our vehicles! October seemed to be the month of electrical inquiries to the Tech Committee, so I thought I would put out some insights I have gained.

Fuel Gauge Readings and the "Other Regulator" Most of the cars (not just Mopars) of the mid 1950s onward were set up with 12 volt electrical systems. These cars, certainly including Plymouth, used fuel gauges which were somewhat unreliable - and typically became more so over the years. Several things can cause this, including fuel sender problems in the tank and bad grounds or conductors. But there is another culprit lurking behind the dash. It is a special regulator for that fuel gauge. This is not the main regulator for the entire car system, but a much smaller one - often in a small metal canister wired or plugged into the back of the instrument console. What that regulator does (or did!) was to supply a 6 volt "reference voltage" to the fuel gauge so it read properly. These regulators were crude electrical devices with points, a heat sensitive metal strip, and a thin

wire wrapping around the strip. Over time, the wire could fail, the points burn out and corrosion set in. All resulted in the fuel gauge readings shifting. Now that we have "electronic" voltage regulators for this application, a swap out is in order. These can be ordered from auto stores, or one can make one from scratch for well under \$10. If you have an interest in learning more about this, contact me and I will get details to you.

Turn Signals - One Filament rear bulbs for 2 uses! Club member Scott Whiteman presented a question about what the wires hanging out from his steering column on a '65 Plymouth went to inside the column. There were some simple ones, like the horn wire, but there was also a lurking question. On the rear combination brake/turn signal bulbs they had only ONE filament in them. Scott put his mind onto this, and figured out that the dual function is a pretty logical electrical situation. In brief, inside the turn signal module on the steering column, there are a number of multi position switches. Two of those switches independently control the rear single filament bulbs. Without the turn signal on, the switches connect the brake light wire to the bulbs. Then, when the turn signal is put on, a switch moves from the brake wire connection over to a turn signal flasher connection. Left and right rear circuits are kept separate from one another. Pretty logical! Scott has prepared extensive and detailed diagrams of the lighting and turn signal functions as they relate to the mid 60's cars. If you would like these diagrams, contact me as I have them on file now.

Six Volts versus Twelve Volts As many of us know, most cars up until the mid 1950s utilized 6 volt batteries - and in many cases they were positive ground. I have not researched the positive versus negative ground issue from day one of batteries in cars, but suspect that when you have no history on connecting batteries - it's a toss up for using a positive or negative ground! Let me know if you have any insight on this. Whatever the case, cars went to 12 volt systems by 1955 as a "standardization". The main reason was that 12 volts and 12 volt starting motors can provide much more starting torque in a same size or smaller setup.

So today, living in a 12 volt world, owners of older 6 volt cars wonder about converting to 12 volts. I got some good advice on this years ago - unless you want or need modern 12 volt radios or other accessories - a six volt system

In way of introduction, we (Phil & Rose Ann Hall) live in Roseburg. We have been married 47 years. We have owned our 1954 Plymouth Belvedere for 44 of those years. We were living in North Carolina in 1973 when we purchased the Plymouth for the awful sum of \$150. I say "awful sum" because at the time \$150 was all the money we had to our name. You all know how it is with a young couple struggling along.

We did not buy the Plymouth as a toy, or because it was an old car, or because we happened to like Plymouths. We bought it because it was a used car that we could afford with the little money we had. There it was; parked behind a gas station; dirty as can be; covered with junk on the hood and roof; looking oh, so forlorn.

Around 2004, the Plymouth was demoted to secondary transportation; still being driven regularly as a utility vehicle, but just not every day. Finally, for the first time ever, we let her license lapse in 2012 and took her off line to start a complete restoration. Labor Day 2016; she drove off under her own power; shining like a new penny. Rose Ann and I did everything ourselves except for installing the windshield and back glass.

Most folks take their newly restored cars to shows and come home with trophies as testimonials of their car's excellence. Instead, Phil and Rose Ann decided to take their newly restored Plymouth on a cross-country, 31 day

vacation. We drove a meandering course across the country to Delaware to visit family. We then drove to upstate New York to visit an old navy friend that I had not seen in almost 50 years. We visited all six New England states. We then drove a meandering course home. In all, we drove the Plymouth over 9,000 miles through 24 states while visiting thirty-four parks, historical sites, and attractions.

We don't have a trophy as a testimonial to the excellence of our Plymouth but we do have a large pile of souvenirs and over 1,000 photographs of this magnificent country of ours.

is perfectly fine. You CAN convert to 12 volts, but there are several main areas needing attention: The starter motor can remain as is - providing you do not crank it long and hard. It WILL turn over much faster than when on 6 volts. The generator or alternator will have to be changed or modified. Swap outs are available, or you can have a generator rewound for 12 volts. The regulator, coil, turn signal flasher, horns, and some form of resistors for other accessories (+ the above mentioned fuel gauge reference voltage) will all have to be changed out or modified. Needless to say, all light bulbs will have to be changed to 12 volts. A bit of good news - 6 volt wiring is heavier than 12 volt requires - so the old wires will be OK.

Something to consider: there are now lots of accessories for computer systems - and they operate on 5+ volts. This means you can potentially run them off of a 6 volt battery with a "low dropout voltage regulator" which will give a constant 5 volt output! The cell phone chargers for cars operate on this same principle - 12 volts in and 5+ volts out!

It is also possible to add 6 volt <u>negative</u> ground devices to a 6 volt <u>positive</u> ground system. A 6 volt starter relay to run horns is a good example. What is required is to mount the device to a non conductive surface (like thick plastic), then mount the plastic to the car metal. A wire for both the negative and positive must then be attached properly to the isolated device. It works!

I hope this helps out a bit. Contact me if the Technical Committee can be of help. P.L.


